Micah 6:8 says, "He has told you, O man, what is good; And what does the LORD require of you But to do justice, to love kindness, And to walk humbly with your God?"

This verse is the counsel of the prophet to God's people after He laid out His indictment against them and they offered to try and appease God. The kingdoms of

Israel and Judah had both embraced idolatry and would be punished for it. However, Micah's focus is not on their idolatry but on their lack of godly character. They scheme iniquity, they fall asleep planning evil things and when

morning comes, they do it! They covet the fields and houses of others and take them. They take advantage of strangers and figure out ways to steal the homes of widows and kick them out into

the street (2:1-9). They were only interested in hearing what they wanted to hear (2:11). Their rulers were described as butchers (3:1-4). Their prophets were greedy and told the people what they wanted to hear (3:5-12). They were brutal to one another, they lacked genuine concern for others and were completely self-focused.

In **Micah 6:1–8**, God opens a cosmic court case against His people. God will lay out His indictment

verse 3, "My people, what have I done to you, And how have I

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wants them to testify about how He has mistreated them and exhausted them. They were acting as if God's demands were so difficult and unreasonable and that trying to please Him was so emotionally draining that they no longer had a will to serve Him. They were acting like the rebellious teenager who says, "I will never be able to please my parents so I'm not even going

wearied you? Answer Me." God

God doesn't wait for their answer.

to try anymore."

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Instead, He testifies Himself, retelling how He delivered them from slavery in Egypt and gave them leaders and spared them from their enemies and gave them the Promised Land. God reminded them of these things so they **might know the righteous** acts of the LORD.

The people of Israel know they are guilty. God has an iron clad case against them. They do not even try to justify their actions; they just want to pay the

fine and move along. In **vv.** 6–7 they begin to plea bargain with God by asking (v. 6), "With what shall I come to the LORD And bow myself before the God on high?" They start with the simple and make their way to the extreme. The first thing they hope will appease God is a simple sacrifice. They ask, "Shall I come to Him with burnt offerings?" God is unmoved. They increase the quality of their sacrifice by offering a **yearling** calf, regarded as the

best sacrificial animal. Still seeing that God is unmoved, they greatly increase the quantity (v. 7).

"Does the LORD take delight in thousands of

rams, In ten thousand rivers of oil?" The increase in quality and value are not enough to appease God. So, they offer the most extreme sacrifice they can think of. Would God be appeased with the "fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" No! God is not satisfied. He wants more. There is an essential element missing from their offers. God is not after bigger, better, or more costly sacrifices. He will only be satisfied with their hearts. Bruce Waltke, in his commentary on Micah said, "False worshippers think God's favor, like theirs, can be bought or earned. They offer the Lord everything but what He asks for: Their loving obedient hearts." (New American

Commentary, Micah, p. 112).

In verse 8, the prophet mercifully reminds the nation what will satisfy God, what He is truly after, "He has told you, O man, what is good; And what does the LORD require of you But to do justice, to love kindness, And to walk humbly with your God?" What God wants is not a secret that must be searched for and discovered, like a buried treasure. The way to please God is not a riddle that must solved, it is not a mystery that must be unraveled; it is a command that must be

obeyed.

God is looking for three characteristics from His people. First, **to do justice**. Treat people justly. Don't just talk about it—do it! Stop seeing others as a means to your personal end. Recognize them as people whom God loves. Second, **to love kindness**. Love doing kind things for others. Exercise mercy every chance you get. This is to be a way of life, not a way of securing future favors. Third, **walk humbly with**

your God. Have a right understanding of who God is and your relationship to Him. God is not your servant, you are His. We are not God's equal. God is not one of our peers. When we have a right understanding of who He is and who we are, we can't help but humble ourselves before Him.

These were not new standards for God's people—they were a reiteration of what had always been the standard for a relationship with God. Consider the following verses: **1 Samuel 15:22**, "...Has the LORD as much delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices As in obeying the voice of the LORD? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, And to heed than the fat of rams." **Psalm 51:16–17**, "For You do not delight in sacrifice, otherwise I would give it; You are not pleased with

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burnt offering. ¹⁷ The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; A broken and a contrite heart, O God, You will not despise." **Hosea 6:6,** "For I delight in loyalty rather than sacrifice, And in the knowledge of God rather than burnt offerings." Jesus addressed the problem of the heart when He chastised the scribes and Pharisees in **Matthew 23:23,** "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you tithe mint and dill and cummin, and have neglected the weightier provisions of the law: justice and mercy and faithfulness; but these are the things you should have done without neglecting the others."

Doing justly, loving mercy, walking humbly with God are not arbitrary qualities—they are qualities that reflect Jesus Christ. We are to live our lives in such a way that others see Christ in us, and we may proclaim Him to the world. Spiritual service that is not done from the heart is empty and meaningless and amounts to nothing more than an attempt to bribe God. God has shown you what is good and what He requires of you: do justice, love kindness, and walk in humility.

A Greater Citizenship from the desk of Pastor Paul

Imagine living in a land where there was no sin. Where there was no ungodliness or deception. A place where righteousness prevails, and love was as natural as breathing. Can you imagine how great that would be? Now imagine that you were rid of all sin, including those hidden sinful desires you might still be wrestling with. How pleasant life would be with no more tears, pain, or suffering. How great it would be that God would dwell physically with His people and His rule would govern all the world. That would

be a wonderful kingdom to dwell in.

In Colossians 1:13, the Apostle Paul explained how it is possible that we have been qualified "to share in the inheritance of the saints in light" (v. 12). Those who have repented and trusted in Jesus have been delivered from the domain of darkness. By the grace and work of God, we

have been rescued from the rule of Satan and sin. We are no longer captive to them. Naturally, we are born into this dark dominion as sinners who love sin (Eph. 2:1–3). The effects of this corruption and wickedness are seen to this day. From countries far away to even our nearest spaces of home, we see the impact of sin.

By God's grace, He saved us from such a life that was deserving of His wrath. Yet, God did not just deliver us from evil's rule and leave us in a neutral space. Instead, believers are placed into a kingdom that is eternally better. The Father has "transferred us to the kingdom of His beloved Son" (v. 13b). God the Father does the work of rescuing and relocating us.

We do not save ourselves. Rather, He has completely removed believers out of Satan's rule and placed them into Christ's kingdom that is characterized as light (1 Pet. 2:9). It is to a position that is ruled by the Almighty King (1 Tim. 15; Rev. 17:14). This King is described as "his beloved Son," who is Jesus Christ (see Mark 1:11). The One who rules is the Son of God who gave His life in obedience to the Father's will to fulfill Scripture, redeem a people, and bring all things into submission under Him. Jesus, the greater Ruler, is preeminent over all, including our lives. To be in His kingdom means to be under His authority and to


belong to Him.

While we still await the full setup of the Kingdom of God when Christ returns, we enjoy the spiritual blessing of it now. Teach Them Diligently... With Your Life

from the desk of Pastor Samuel

Over the past few months, I've been writing about family worship in general and specific aspects of it. This is an often-forgotten aspect of the Christian life these days, and it ought to be more common. In the seventeenth century, Puritan pastors would refuse to let a man partake in communion during a Sunday service if he had not spent the week leading his family in family worship (singing, reading the Word, and praying). They viewed this as a prime opportunity for this man to teach the gospel to his wife and children.

Without understanding the importance of the gospel

in the home, that family may not truly understand and appreciate the significance of a corporate gathering on a Sunday. This is why consistent family worship is so crucial.

Deuteronomy 6 is an overflowing fountain of wisdom

when it comes to worshiping the Lord. It begins with the most fundamental command of Scripture ("You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might," v. 5) and lays out when you should fulfill this command (in every situation, vv. 6–9). Later, Moses explains how parents ought to use this as a teaching opportunity for their kids:

When your son asks you in time to come, "What is the meaning of the testimonies and the statutes and the rules that the LORD our God has commanded you?" then you will say to your son, "We were Pharaoh's slaves in Egypt. And the LORD brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand. ... And the LORD commanded us to do all these statutes, to fear the LORD our God, for our good always, that he might preserve us alive, as we are this day. And it will be righteousness for us, if we are careful to do all this

commandment before the LORD our God, as he has commanded us." (vv. 20–25)

This is all part of laying a foundation in your child's heart so that they will grow to trust in Christ as their Savior and walk in faithful obedience to His commands. What your kids learn in your home will have a profound effect on the rest of their lives.

But don't neglect this important fact: the example you lead in your home is what your kids will catch over time. Look back at Deuteronomy 6:6—"These words that I am giving you today are to be *in your heart*" (emphasis added). Your view of the gospel and its importance in your life will be revealed in your children. If it's nothing more than a passive

hobby to you, your children won't find it that important either. On the other hand, if the gospel is your lifeblood, the thing that fuels how you live, your kids will catch on to that and want to understand why it is so important to you.

This doesn't just apply in the context of a parent with their children. You

have a measure of influence on each person you come into contact with. That influence is strongest within a family, of course, but it is also felt within your church family. Whatever is of primary importance to you will express itself to everyone you meet. What do people see in you? What do you see in others?

True worship of God starts in your heart and expresses itself more and more to those around you. It is seen most clearly by the people closest to younamely, your family. You have an incredible opportunity to sow seeds of faith in your children as they see you joyfully obeying the commands of Christ in worship to Him each day, whether that's through concentrated time of family worship or through faithfulness in day-to-day activities. What a glorious privilege!

The Necessity of Repentance and Faith

The birth of a child is a wonderful thing. One of the first things babies do when they emerge from the womb is to take a big gulp of air, filling their lungs for the first time with oxygen as they begin the process of breathing. That process, the constant action of inhaling and exhaling, is one of the most vital activities of life, so much so that if the baby stopped, their brain would be damaged in a matter of minutes and soon after that death would come. So, it is important that the activity which began on day one remains constant to allow for the life and growth of that child.

Well, for believers, faith and repentance operate in a very similar fashion. On day one of a believer's walk with Christ, they exercise their new-found faith and

are granted repentance as they turn from sin toward righteousness for the first time. And this process of faith and repentance is not something that only happens

at the beginning—it must take place on a daily basis for growth and change in Christlikeness to occur.

We have been moving our way through a series of articles designed to help us understand the fundamentals of biblical counseling: what it is, what it seeks to accomplish, and how it works. What we found was that biblical counseling seeks to bring about change as the believer, through faith in Christ and reliance upon the Holy Spirit, puts forth the effort to follow the Lord in obedience to what the Bible instructs. Galatians 2:20 says, "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me." God works, we work, and the result is growth in Christlikeness. This is the process of change in biblical counseling.

As we continue this series, we will switch gears,

changing our focus away from the fundamentals of biblical counseling to its necessary components. We begin by looking at the necessity of faith and repentance. At the moment of salvation, by grace the believer puts their faith and trust in the Lord Jesus Christ and turns from sin, the sin that has been forgiven by Christ through His death on the cross. That initial action of turning from sin in repentance and to Christ in faith is what begins the Christian's life with the Lord. Just as a newborn baby must continue to breathe in and out to continue to live, so the believer must continue to practice faith and repentance in order to grow in godliness.

Because Christians dwell in a sinful world and live in sinful bodies with sinful hearts and minds, they will continue to struggle with sin throughout their

lives. As a result, there is a constant need to turn from away sin, forsaking those things that displease the Lord. Christians must hate sin as God hates sin and stop commit-

ting the thoughts, words, and actions for which Christ died. At the same time, they must continue to practice faith as they turn away from sin to Christ, trusting that only in Him is found forgiveness and hope for change. Faith, which includes clinging to the gospel truths of Scripture and claiming the promises of God, manifests itself in dependent obedience as the believer puts on godly attitudes and actions, believing that God's way is best.

In short, repentance keeps Christians turning from sin, and faith keeps them turning to Christ. This is the continual, daily process that every Christian must engage in, and this is a necessary component in biblical counseling in order to bring about true growth and change.
