The Apostle Paul really wanted to visit the church in Rome. In the fourth sentence of the epistle to the Romans he wrote, "For I long to see you so that I may impart some spiritual gift to you, that you may be established; that is, that I may be encouraged together with you while among you, each of us by the other's faith, both yours and

mine" (Romans 1:11-12). Paul states two reasons he wanted to visit the church in Rome. First, he desired to serve the church by helping to strengthen their faith. He wanted to use his gifts to minister to the saints. He hoped to share something that would

strengthen their walk with Christ.

Second, Paul wanted to spend time with the Christians in Rome for mutual encouragement. That is, he hoped to be an encouragement to them as they served the Lord in a difficult location. Rome was the seat of the empire that promoted idol and emperor worship. For the most part, the city was antagonistic toward Christianity. Paul was also hoping to be encouraged by their faith and their faithfulness. He wanted to see the fruit of the gospel being lived out in their lives.

I certainly do not consider myself worthy to be compared to Paul in

One of our church members commented to me half-

way through the Eastridge Team's time here, "This is the highlight of my year." When I asked him if he would have them come back again, he laughed at me like I had asked the most ignorant question anyone could ask. "Of course!" he responded with a joyful grin.

The effect of twelve people with God's kingdom on their

hearts descending on a small church in a small town is hard to estimate. I could quantify it by describing the 28 kids who came to the VBS we otherwise could not have conducted, or the fellowship room the team painted that increased the room's usability about 100-fold, or the conference they hosted, or

the hours Pastor John poured into teaching the flock, or the new bike trail they cut for

our town, or the gracious time they spent with my kids. But the sum, in this case, is greater than the parts. The very presence of the team in our church instantly brought a living display of servanthearted love.

On the Sunday the team was here, John preached a message titled, "Love Enough to Be a Servant." It was taken from the passage in the gospel of John when Jesus takes up water and a towel and washes

his disciples' feet. We had twelve manifestations of that message all week long. I was left inspired and asking the Lord that perhaps one day our church might have a team we could send to be as much of a blessing to others as the Eastridge Team was to us.

It is a tremendous joy to gather together to serve side-by-side, have fun, and point kids to the truth of God's Word! I am thankful to the Lord that He provided the opportunity for us to host a weeklong VBS this year. The campus was decorated with a Sci-fi space theme as if the children were on a space-ship. We enjoyed a wonderful (and loud) time of singing together every evening and it was a joy to watch both kids and adults singing in unison. Each evening consisted of a skit that helped reinforce the Bible lesson for the night. After the opening ceremonies, kids rotated in teams through four

stations. In the Main Hanger they played games; in the Research Lab they learned about the Bible; in the Engineering Room they made crafts, and in the Mess Hall they had snacks and learned about the

missionary George Muller, who provides an amazing example of trusting in the Lord.

This year's theme was Eternal Destination: Trusting God on the Journey with Proverbs 3:5 being the theme verse ("Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding.") We learned from Hebrews 11 that other people who are trusting in the Lord can help encourage us to continue to live for Jesus. Lastly, on Day 5 we discussed staying faithful on the journey. A Legacy of Blessing and Serving Others by Daná Freeland

Few people have *both* the gift of being an artist and of having a gentle, kind spirit to teach, encourage, and inspire others to awaken their artistic bent. Although I have never taken an art class from Alaire Irish, I was amazed at the beautiful artwork I saw displayed by her students—both children and adults—in the church foyer. When I heard that Alaire would be retiring this year from

teaching her watercolor painting classes after more than 20 years, I knew I had to find out more about the talents she had shared with others and the legacy she had created.

Alaire was born in Seattle and has lived her whole life in King County. She met her husband at church, raised 4 boys, and

later went to work in a school lunchroom, which she retired from in 1994. At that time, she and her daughter-in-law took a painting class together. Alaire said that there was some artistic flare in her family—her father liked to draw, and her aunt liked to paint. Shortly thereafter, Alaire began developing her own artistic talent with watercolor paints.

Eventually, a homeschool mom asked Alaire to teach her daughter and her friends some painting techniques. That grew into a two-decade stint with innumerable students. The things that endeared her to her students and provided the atmosphere for budding artists included such practical advice and teaching methods as:

- Tips on shading and which paints to use
- Reminding her students to "Go slow, take your time, don't rush"
- Having a keen sense of her students' strengths
- Gently pushing students to try new things when they were getting stuck

 Discipling her students to use their various talents and gifts to serve and be a blessing to others.

Alaire definitely has used her various talents to serve and bless others over the years including being a Sunday School teacher, playing her violin on the worship team and for banquets, being involved with the choir as both a singer and a direc-

tor, baking amazing treats, serving on the prayer chain, and being involved with the missions ministry. Alaire has frequent communications with our missionaries and has a monthly prayer time set aside to gather to pray for them.

When asked what was next

for her, Alaire mentioned that she would be moving into Farrington Court Retirement Community, and she wanted to continue to serve the Lord until He takes her home. Quite likely, in addition to continued involvement with the missions ministry, Alaire will be encouraging two of her art students—Nicole Elliott and Samantha Goheen—who to plan to teach art to students as well.

As Alaire retires from teaching, no doubt she will continue her thoughtful and caring ways and create a comfortable, welcoming atmosphere for everyone she encounters.



The Gospel Gardener From the desk of Pastor Samuel

I've never had anything close to a "green thumb." Any plant I've tried to care for has come out far worse for wear. Most of the casualties sustained from my gardening attempts have come from a lack of effort. Any enthusiasm I had at the beginning quickly died (along with the plant). I was not willing to put in the work it would take to sustain its life.

Gardening (just like its big brother, farming) requires dedicated effort, both to care for each plant and to know *how* to care for each plant. If you are diligent to put in the work, watering and feeding the plants in

your garden (or the crops on your farm), eventually you will reap the rewards of your efforts. And more often than not, the benefit at the end is worth all the effort from the start.

In many ways, the Christian life is just like gardening. Most people do not be-

come Christians after one evangelistic conversation. It takes careful, dedicated effort by people over time, sowing gospel seeds in the hearts of others, before any harvest is seen in someone's life. Even when one Christian is discipling or counseling another Christian, it often takes time for the person to see why and how he must change so he is walking more faithfully with Christ. The majority of conversations we may have with people are opportunities for gardening rather than harvesting.

But here's the most remarkable thing about gospel gardening: though we have been called to put in this hard work, we do not accomplish any growth on our own. In gospel-sharing opportunities, the Holy Spirit

is at work within us so that He can work within the heart of the other person. He is working to produce the fruit that we may not immediately see. No one, not even the apostle Paul, can bring anyone to saving faith by themselves.

"What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you believed, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither he who plants nor he who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. He who plants and he who waters are one, and each will receive his wages according to his labor. For we

are God's fellow workers." (1 Corinthians 3:5-9a, emphasis added)

Yes, gardening is hard work, work that every believer is called to do. But we are not working alone. God is working through us to facilitate growth within someone



else, either to saving faith or strengthened faith. Do not shy away from the hard work. Paul himself said that "each will receive his wages according to his labor" (1 Cor. 3:8). Each gospel gardener is able to rejoice in the work God has done in the lives of those around them. Christ has called His disciples to garden; let's get to the good work!

Building Each Other Up from the desk of Pastor Ryan

One of the ways to draw a crowd to the church is to talk about eschatology, or the study of last things. Announce that there will be a discussion on the end times and people come from far and wide to hear what will be said. The typical topics addressed are things like pre-trib, post-trib, or mid-trib rapture; premil or amil; and the meaning of the images in the book of Revelation. However, once these terms start flowing, debate begins to rage, and the unity of the church is threatened. Fortunately, the apostle Paul provides us with a safeguard against such tensions.

Paul writes, "Therefore encourage one another and build one another up, just as you are doing" (1 Thess

5:11). This is one of those "oneanother" passages of the New Testament which points out how believers are to interact within the body of Christ. Now the context of this statement is Paul's discussion about the coming of Christ and the Day of the Lord. Even though he mentions some details about what

will happen at the end of time, he desires his readers to practice edification (4:18; 5:11). Paul does not want the uncertainty of those days to be a source of trouble and division, but a motivation to work for unity within the body of Christ.

In these chapters in 1 Thessalonians, Paul wants us to be people who have hope in the gospel (4:13, 14). He also instructs us to live as children of light (5:5), to be awake and sober (5:6), to put on the breastplate of faith and love and the helmet of the hope of our salvation (5:8), and to rest in the fact that we are not destined for wrath but to obtain salvation through Christ (5:10). In short, Paul wants us to hope in the gospel, build others up in the gospel, live out the gospel, and encourage others to do the same, especially in light of the coming Day of the Lord. The author of Hebrews echoes these remarks when he writes, "Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for

he who promised is faithful. And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near" (Heb 10:23 -25). The study of eschatology is to be a catalyst for hope, unity, and mutual encouragement.

Now, please do not misunderstand me. I am not calling for us to throw our theological convictions out the window. I am not advocating panmillennialism—that all you need to do is love Jesus and it will all pan out in the end. No, have convictions, and hold your convictions to the glory of God. Our church teaches, and I believe in, the pre-trib, premil dispensational position. But let's

not allow our convictions to be a reason for unnecessary division among our brothers and sisters in Christ, and cause us to neglect the unifying work of encouragement and building up one another. Do not let our differences in theological positions rob us of the joy that comes from knowing we have

been saved from the condemnation of our sin and will one day be with the Lord.

So how do you apply this "one-another" passage? One way to encourage and build others up is to take time to mention evidence of godliness you see in them. For example, say you see an adult and a child playing a fun, silly game together at church. You could go up to that person later and say something like, "You know, Jesus loves kids, and He loves it when we love kids too, so good job in showing the love of Christ to that child through that fun, little game you were playing. Keep up the good work!" Through that small statement you let them know that you noticed godliness in them and want them to continue to do more. That is how we encourage one another and build each other up in the gospel, all the while waiting for the glorious Day of the Lord.
