## Stand the Test

from the desk of Pastor Samuel

How does the believer grow in his or her faith? What are the most effective tools to cultivate spiritual maturity? According to James, the difficult trials of life are one of the tools the Lord uses to lead us into maturity.

James's letter to the early church reads like a spiritual checklist, a series of tests believers will endure in this life that cultivates

spiritual maturity. He desired to see the early church continue to flourish and spread worldwide, and his letter still accomplishes that purpose today. With only the bare minimum introduction, James launches into this series of tests with a command that would

have been directly applicable to his original audience, but might shock us at first glance: Count it all joy, my brothers, when you meet trials of various kinds, for you know that the testing of your faith produces steadfastness. And let steadfastness have its full effect, so that you may be perfect and complete, lacking in nothing. (James 1:2-4)

Count it all *joy*? When it comes to trials, we'd much rather retreat than rejoice. In our day, we have

such ubiquitous access to easy distractions that it can be tempting to try and steer clear of trials for the sake of convenience and comfort, rather than face them head-on. But note that James says, "when you meet trials." God

has ordained tests and trials to enter our lives to test the foundation of our faith—they are not optional and you can't ignore them!

Wind. These trees had never encountered any kind of stress from wind, so their roots and trunks never created any stress bark to reinforce the base of the tree. As the trees grew taller, their roots were not

properly prepared for the physical toil they would endure, so they crumbled. If they had endured the regular stresses of life outside the biosphere, they would have built up the proper root strength to endure and thrive, possibly for centuries.

We cannot hide from the regular stresses of life and expect to become mature in our faith. We must walk through these various trials, relying on the Lord to sustain us through them (1 Cor. 10:13), building integrity and faithfulness to the commands of Scripture. Only when we are faithful in the hard times can we be faithful in the easier

times. So we rejoice in trials and sufferings because we know that our endurance of those trials will lead us to greater communion with our Lord (who suffered as we do! Heb 2:14-18).

None of this means we will never experience sor-

row or anger or confusion again. It will rarely get easier to maintain a joyful attitude in trials, as James commands. The key thing is to remember the ultimate purpose of the trials: they mature us as

believers and we glorify God through our trust in Him. We have hope that He will finish the work He started in us (Phil 1:6), and one day the suffering we face on this earth will be eradicated. Until then, we endure with joy, patience, and wisdom.

Blessed is the man who remains steadfast under trial, for when he has stood the test he will receive the crown of life, which God has promised to those who love him. (James 1:12)

## Grief: Finding Hope Again by Paul David Tripp A Book Review by Cathy Mickelson

The sudden death of a spouse, a tragic accident that takes the life of a child, the slow decline of an elderly parent into unconsciousness until they breathe no longer. The death of a loved one – a spouse, a parent, a child or any person with whom one is close is one of the most devastating experiences that we will ever face. How do we find hope

at such a time of loss? Paul
Tripp helps answer that question by helping us think through
that time when death will enter
the door and what to do when it
does enter our life.

He warns us that we cannot prepare for death. As much as we think we can, we are never totally prepared for the time when the death of a loved one enters the door. We do not sail through that moment easily. Tripp explains that death was not part of God's original plan. Death is described by Paul as our "enemy" (1 Corinthians 15:25-26).

But, we must remember that we are never alone in the darkness

of grief. Feelings of separation and alienation accompany grief as reflected in Psalm 88:18. We must remind ourselves that God understands the darkness we are in. He is right there with us, "an ever-present help in trouble" (Psalm 46:1).

Tripp reminds us that often beautiful things come as a result of horrible things, the cross being the ultimate example of this. What could be worse than the killing of the Messiah? But God planned from the beginning to use the ultimate evil to

accomplish the ultimate good for humanity. God conquered sin and death through the cross. Every death points us to the promise that Christ brings a resurrection once and forever. Through Christ, death has been defeated.


We mourn for good reason. We mourn not only for the loved one we have lost, but also for the fact that death continues to destroy. God doesn't call us to put on a happy face when we are crushed. The comfort and hope He provides enable us to

grieve in a new and different way, not like "others who have no hope" (1 Thes. 4:13).

Tripp then offers practical strategies for dealing with grief including: speak with honest emotion; run to where comfort can be found (2 Corinthians 1:3-4); **resist grief's** temptations (doubt, anger, envy, self-pity); seek God's resources (Himself, your church, family and friends); look for blessings in your grief (cultivate a grateful heart for God's provisions and faithfulness); rely on your spiritual habits (prayer, reading God's Word, worshiping God through hymns and worship songs, and attending church); and finally, celebrate **eternity**. God's promise to us is

that all grief, suffering, and death will end. There is glorious life after death when God will dry your last tear and you will never have a reason to cry again.

We are then encouraged to encourage others with the comfort we have received. Your grief will open up doors of opportunity to minister to others who experience grief. Tripp states, "Death will one day die, and that is a cause for rejoicing! May you look through the darkness and see Christ's light. In

your deep sadness, receive the comfort that only he can give. May he give you the grace to think about death in distinctly biblical ways. May you respond with the hope, surety, and courage of faith."

# Meet the Pogue Family by Daná Freeland

In the last few months, our church has added several new members. This section of the newsletter will begin to spotlight the new families who have joined our church. This month, I was privileged to have the opportunity to interview the Pogue family.

Ryan and Rebecca both grew up in Michigan. While attending college, Ryan worked at a grocery store where a fellow employee challenged him to read the Bible. Eventually, he had questions and was directed to the pastor of a local church. He had many visits with this pastor and came to a

Faith Promise Missions at Eastridge

In 2010, the Eastridge elders made the decision to support missions through a separate giving program called Faith Promise Missions and that is the program we still use today. Faith Promise Missions (FPM) is managed separately from the general budget so that missions do not compete with other ministry goals. The congregation is encouraged to give to FPM over and above their normal giving to the general fund. Since the inception of FPM at Eastridge, we have seen the overall missions giving grow considerably and we hope to expand missions at EBC to greater levels in the future.

As a part of our stewardship of the FPM funds, the elders have developed guidelines for the selection and funding of missionaries.

#### **Guidelines for Funding for Missions**

- A single missionary or training center receives between \$200 and \$400 per month from Eastridge (exceptions allowed by elder agreement)
- We aim to provide between 5-10% of a missionary's monthly support
- Short-term missions (STM) may be partially funded through FPM, up to \$400 per person or \$2,000 per STM

#### **Guidelines for Missionary Selection**

The primary focus of the EBC missions effort is strengthening the indigenous church around the world. Therefore our focus is on missionary applicants who: 1) have a high view of God; 2) have a high view of Scripture; 3) have a proper view of conversion and sanctification; 4) have a focus on developing national pastoral leadership; and 5) work in areas where the gospel is largely unknown, opposed, or misrepresented.

In many countries there are lots of churches that are being led by pastors who have scant training



in God's Word, that don't know how to study it, that don't now how to teach it, and many that don't know how to apply it to their lives and the lives of their congregants. There is a critical need in the churches of the world to raise up godly leaders. This is where EBC missions is oriented.

#### **Missionary Application Process**

EBC has a formal process for evaluating missionary support requests. First, applicants must submit a detailed written missionary support application which is evaluated against the above five selection criteria. Applicants that are highly rated after this evaluation are held in a pool waiting funding availability. When funds are available, the elders select from among these candidates for further consideration. Candidates are either interviewed by telephone/video or may be invited to speak to the church on a Sunday. After such interviews are completed, the elders will make a support decision and the missionary is added to our list of financially supported missionaries.




